Survey Results – Police Related

From 09/14/23 through 10/01/23 the City of Darien conducted a survey where residents were asked several key questions about operations within the city. Many of those questions were related to police services. They included:

1. Q-13: Do you feel safe in your neighborhood during the day?
2. Q-14: Do you feel safe in your neighborhood during at night?
3. Q-15: Do you feel safe in the Darien parks?
4. Q-16: Do you feel that the police patrol in Darien is sufficient?
5. Q-17: If you answered no to any questions (13-16), what is the issue that you believe most threatens your safety or perceptions of safety?
6. Q-18: What are the top three things the police department should focus on over the next five years in order to keep Darien a safe community?

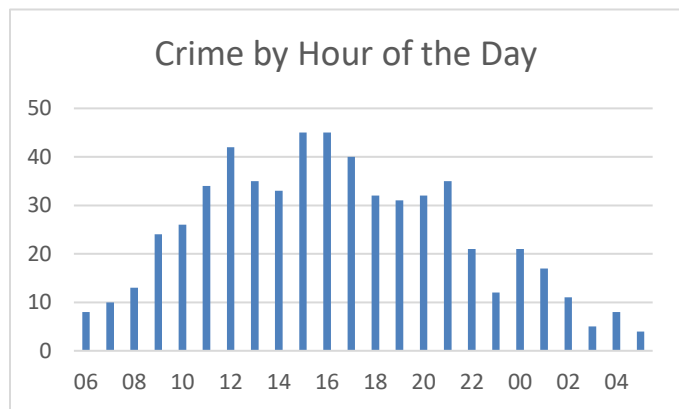
We thank the city for conducting the survey and very much appreciate the 511 respondents who completed the survey. Residents had an opportunity to write a narrative to explain their yes, no or no opinion response.

Daytime Neighborhood Safety (Q-13)

We were happy to see that nearly 96% of residents felt safe in their respective neighborhoods during daytime hours. Just over 2% felt unsafe and almost 2% had no opinion. Though only 2% of residents felt unsafe we have some work to do for everyone to feel safe.

Nighttime Neighborhood Safety (Q-14)

Residents’ perception of safety changed significantly during nighttime hours where 14% of residents felt unsafe during nighttime hours versus only 2% during daytime hours. Approximately 6.5% of respondents had no opinion. Unfortunately there wasn’t a lot of direction for the police department to take to address residents’ perception or reality of crime at night from the narrative responses. That being said we have a desire for all to feel safe and be safe, all the time.



Here’s what the data (facts) show. For this analysis we made it easy and just used 6:00am to 6:00pm for daytime and 6:00pm to 6:00am for nighttime. Approximately 61% of crime occurs during daytime hours and 39% occur at night. We average about 1.6 crimes per day, about 1 crime per day during daytime hours and 0.6 crimes per day during nighttime hours. Many crimes are not “street” crimes (e.g. domestic violence, retail theft, etc.) Again further reducing the amount of street level crime and how likely one is to be the victim of a crime.

Safety in the Parks (Q-15)

The perception of safety in the parks showed 62% felt safe, 7% unsafe and 30% had no opinion. We analyzed the three larger parks by reviewing four years of data (2020 through 2023). This is what we found:

The amount of calls were slight and most involved a belief of suspicious person, vehicle or activity. We appreciate the “see something, say something” attitude. Best to call if you think something is amiss and allow the police to investigate. The amount of crime reported was nearly non-existent. In three parks for four years there were a total of seven crimes reported. The types of crimes were theft, criminal damage to property and a domestic violence. Calls for service have decreased over time, comparing calls for service in 2020 to 2023 (1 less month) there was a 26% decrease in calls for service.

Police Patrol (Q-16)

Only 56% of residents felt the police patrols in their neighborhoods were enough, 13% felt there was not enough police patrols and 12% had no opinion. This is an interesting perception. With numbers like this we’ve failed whether a perception or reality. As a police department residents need to feel safe and seeing police is a part of that process. The first police related question, Q-13, showed 96% felt safe. This question (Q-16) is much lower. Does seeing the police have any relationship to feeling safe? Hard to understand based on the low number of detailed narrative responses. Not seeing the police may have to do with idea of seeing value in paying taxes – a return on investment of sorts when the police are seen in the neighborhood.

During several City Council meetings I explained changes to staffing allocations resulting in different staffing levels. This is our current situation compared to prior allocations.

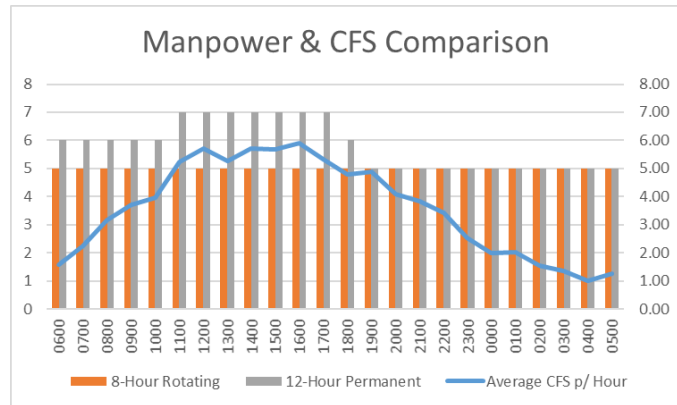

When I came to Darien we had 34 authorized positions and eight years later we continue to have 34 authorized positions. However, there is one less deputy chief (or similar position – regardless of title) and one less sergeant. There are two additional patrol officers, the sworn position that will

answer your call for service, investigate a crime, crash or concern, will take proactive actions, etc. “more on the street.”

In the past we had rotating shifts. What happens with rotating shifts is you have to have a balance of officers on each shift even though one time period may have significantly less calls for service and crime and another shift may have higher crime and calls for service, but are staffed the same. In 2021 we went to permanent shifts which allows for officers to be assigned based on need – matching personnel allocations with workload.

This chart it shows the relationship between manpower by hour of the day and the average frequency of calls for service. There is a multiplier added to the frequency to account for multiple vehicle responses. There is also a multiplier added to ensure adequate policing for preventative patrol. You see by the graph that our manpower is sufficient. There are times that bad things happen that more officers are needed than we have on patrol. There are options, for such instances, mutual aid, back up from surrounding agencies, Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS), etc.



There was a number of times last year that alderman would discuss comments from constituents about not seeing the police. I asked our County IT personnel to look at a street where the public commented on never seeing the police. I was able to demonstrate, looking at our GPS signals from patrol cars that, though the public said there were no patrols, there were police patrolling, in fact one squad drove the street three times in one shift when community said zero.

Threats to Safety (Q-17)

I reviewed the narrative responses and tried, best I could, to quantify them. Unfortunately most respondents to the survey wrote “crime” or “safety” or “traffic” with no detail. Some said things like gangs, robberies, etc. Some answers to concerns may be found in Question 18 Crime and Safety discussion to follow.

Focus of Keep Darien Safe (Q-18)

Reading through the responses three areas for the police department stood out. They were:

1. Communication
 - a. Notification (Texting Service)
 - b. Community Outreach
2. Visibility & Staffing
3. Crime & Safety

Notification

Survey comments were plentiful regarding the desire to have a notification system via text messaging. In the past we had such a system called Nixle. Unfortunately only 390 residents made use of Nixle. We opted to move to Twitter (X) and have over 2,400 followers and sometimes, depending on the posting, the Tweet gets retweeted – reaching an even larger audience. However, we continue to hear from the public and elected officials of the need for text messaging. Beginning early 2024 we will have a text notification system.

We'll put out text messages regarding emergency or urgent need to know items such as road blockage due to accidents, major events and safety concerns – robberies, residential burglaries, etc. We'll continue to use X, but tweets will be for outreach matters – Library Discussion, Cop on Top, Coffee with a Cop, Shop with a Hero, National Night Out and other outreach activities and public service announcements.

Community Outreach

We've been involved in many community engagement activities. We belong to a group called Unity Partnership. UP was started due to Sandra Bland, a black woman from Lisle who died while in police custody in Texas following a traffic stop. We continue to interact with this organization. One of our hopes with the organization was to have many conversations with the community on the topic of policing.

We are extremely proud of our officers who have donated their time, finances and skills. There are many examples, Movember saw \$1,500 raised for men's health. This month eight officers are donating time and money for children to have an opportunity to Shop with a Hero (police officer or fire fighter). At many events you may have attended such as National Night Out, Coffee with a Cop, etc. most of those officers were off-duty, not receiving overtime or other compensation.

We conduct several community talks. This year the Indian Prairie Public Library asked us to participate in a monthly safety dialogue. We started the discussions beginning in September. We continue to meet with neighborhood groups, social clubs and have events including Coffee with a Cop, Cop on Top, Shop with a Hero, Movember, National Night Out, Faith in Blue and others. We've used social media – Twitter and Facebook. We've been invited to various faith-based groups. For example, we attended an event on behalf of the Dawoodi Bohra Muslim community of Chicago located in Willowbrook on November 14th. The Muslim community hails from India, Pakistan and East Africa. Several police agencies were present for lunch, interacting and learning about their culture and religion

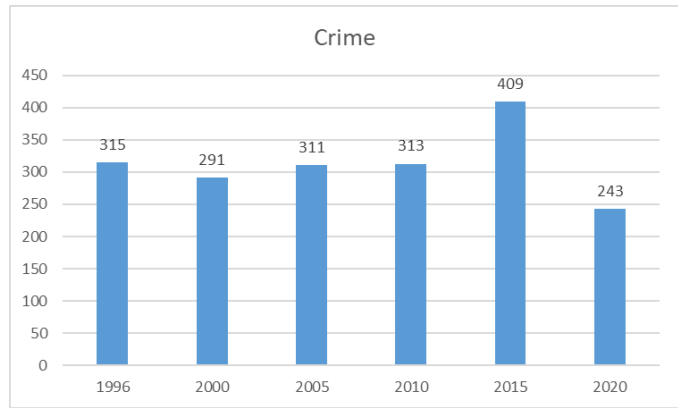
Visibility & Staffing

Visibility and staffing was discussed relative to question 16 – police patrols.

Crime & Safety

We group our efforts into three categories: crime, crashes and concerns. I reviewed the responses relative to safety to attempt to quantify the written responses. However, the lack of detail made it difficult.

I looked at crime as defined by Uniformed Crime Reports (UCR) standards back 27 years and it shows that crime is at an all-time low. The farthest back I could find data was 1996. I tried to look at every five years.



Because of the change from one method of counting crime UCR and National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) it is difficult to track crime over time. This graph shows prior years data compared to 2023 using NIBRS data. Demonstrating that total crime continues to decrease.

Again the feedback is important and appreciated. You should, and can, have your say on police matters. We're available to have discussions at many various public meetings we have, that include: Cop on Top, Coffee with a Cop, National Night Out, Library, Neighborhood Meetings, etc.

Please review the monthly and annual reports that are put together as they give a lot of good information relative to crime, crashes and concerns as well as operations.

There is a lot the public can do to protect themselves.

Regarding thefts, our most frequent crime type, most were due to unsecure property.

Fraud is the next most frequent crime type. Here too there are means not to be a victim. We hosted a seminar at the Indian Prairie Library in October to discuss how not to be a victim.

Domestic battery & assaults and abuse is a terrible situation. To harm a loved one is bad. However, in context of being safe in the community, these offenses are not directed toward the masses, it is specifically directed to a family member. If this is you we're here to help. If it is not you, again in context of fear level of crime, this is not a "street" crime and this number doesn't impact the level of your "public" safety.

When we hear of the crimes on the news and about larger cities and the spill over into the suburbs we tend to get more fearful. It is important to take it into context. Understand that we're fearful and use that fear to be cautious, but not to isolate oneself and not enjoy life.

We perform a number of crime prevention / pro-active activities to try to ensure safety. We conducted, year to date, 7,365 proactive calls for service – traffic stops, checked suspicious persons, vehicles & circumstances, performed extra patrols, vacation watches, etc.

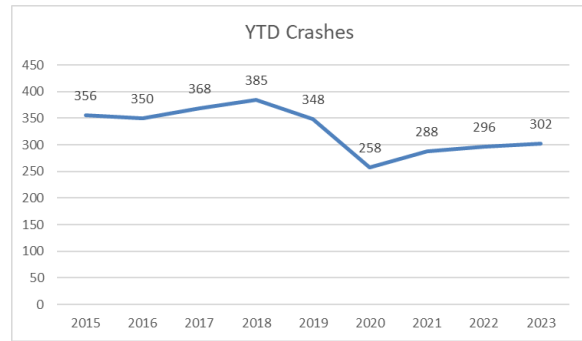
This month, based on data and previously reported areas of concern we deployed several Directed Patrols. Here is a snapshot of these areas and results. Again, these Directed Patrols were not generated due to a citizen's concern as documented at the end of this monthly report.

In our course of police work we also utilize the philosophy of Community-Oriented Policing (COP). Every contact is a COP contact and officer have visited lemonade stands, fixed bicycle chain, motorist assist, etc.

Crashes

I took a look at crashes as well. We need some type of measure of driving safety and crashes is one means of doing that. Crashes too have dropped from prior years. With our system I was able to look at data back to 2015 (8 years).



Concerns

On the last page of the Monthly Report we document the numerous citizen complaints that come to our attention through residents calling, resident talking to their alderman and the alderman talking to us, etc. Included in the reporting is what occurred, the frequency we were there, the number of minutes we were there, the number of stops and citations issued, etc.

Events

Library Community Discussion

There was a meeting held at Indian Prairie Public Library on Wednesday, December 6th at 10:00 am. The topic discussed was about self-protection. The meeting took place in the Board Room which is on the second floor of Indian Prairie Library. There were nine attendees interacting with Officer Rundell and Deputy Chief Norton who put together the presentation, on a community driven topic of self-protection. Discussions included situational awareness, see something say something, prevention, tools of protection and stress inoculation.

The next community discussion will be on Wednesday, January 3rd, 2024 at 10:00 am again in the Board Room on the second floor of the library (<https://ippl.libcal.com/event/10650599>). The topic for this meeting is proposed to be fire safety. We are arranging to have a member of the fire department present this topic. Again, thank you to Indian Prairie Public Library and Marquitta Harris for hosting and putting these meetings together.

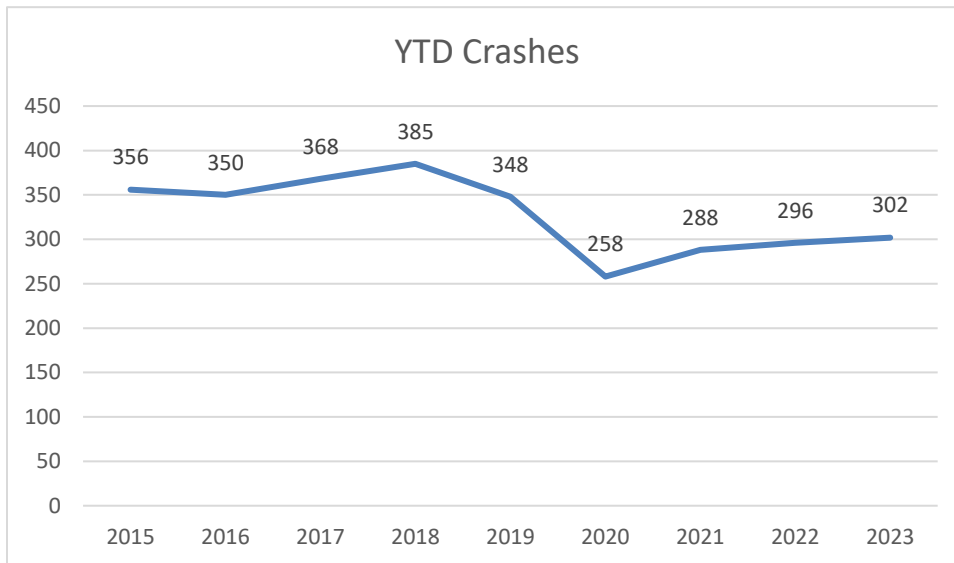
